MISSOULA COUNTY DETENTION FACILITY (MCDF)

- 224 County beds
 - 48 beds for women
 - 16 max security beds
 - 16 special classification beds
 - 144 general population male beds
- 24-bed juvenile unit
- 144 contracted DOC assessment center beds
- 2017 average daily inmate count = 223 for county beds
 - 80-90% = 179-202 beds filled

WHO'S IN OUR JAIL?

- April 3, 2018

MCDF population is as follows:

MASC--144/144 (We are currently housing 2 MASC inmates in Unit 2)

County--187/224 (We are currently utilizing 2 MASC beds for county inmates)

Juvenile--9/24 (7 are Missoula County youth)

We are currently sitting at 17% DOC inmates with no local holds. 2 males are scheduled for transport to programs Thursday.

We are currently over hard beds in 0 population pods.

As of today our population is approximately the following:

Total county inmates-187

111 (59%)--District Court/Felony Holds

31 (17%)--DOC Inmates with no local holds


22 (12%)--Federal Inmates

11 (6%)--Municipal Court Holds

4 (2%)--Justice Court Holds (misdemeanors)

INCARCERATION RATES (PER 100,000)




SEQUENTIAL INTERCEPT MAPPING - 2015



RECOMMENDATIONS BEING ADDRESSED


- Sheriff's Office: Sheriff TJ McDermott

Percentage of Inmates



 - Pre-trial Program
 - Recs 4.3, 4.8, 5.1, 5.7 – evidence-based risk assessments (at booking, for release, sentencing, and bond)
 - Rec 4.6 - text court reminders

- Rec 3.5 (social detox) and 3.6 (drop-in center and permanent supportive housing)
 - Frequent Utilizer Systems Engagement grant
- Other mental health and housing initiatives

 - Housing Steering Committee

FUTURE

- Continue efforts on the on-going and unaddressed items
 - Continue Native Outreach Project
- Continue to assess those put on hold
- County Attorney Pabst: prosecution-led diversion
- Criminal Justice Coordinating Council
- *For appropriate populations, reduce the number incarcerated, reduce length of stay, increase links to community treatment, and reduce recidivism to*
 - *Enhance the quality of life so people can thrive and realize individual and collective potential (vision)*
 - *Promote a healthy, safe, and vibrant community (goal)*
